AND EVEN EARLIER

LOCKDOWN I

In September 1517Henry VIII demanded that the Dean of St George, Windsor provide regulations to manage infection (plague). The Dean favoured quarantine which had long been used in southern Europe. An infected individual property was to be shut for forty days with all occupants restricted, inside, except one who could leave to collect meat and drink. This person had to carry 'always openly upward a white rod four feet long', so that he could be avoided. The infected property had to show its contagion by putting an eight foot pole out of the window, with a wisp of hay at the end. These regulations were the first such in England and became guidelines for the rest of the country.

LOCKDOWN II

In 1665, plague came to Eyam, a Derbyshire village, in a consignment of cloth from London. The disease soon spread. The Rector, William Mompesson, working with Thomas Stanley, a previously evicted Puritan minister introduced various precautions which culminated in villagers agreeing to quarantine the entire village to prevent the disease spreading to other settlements. The plague continued for 14 months, with many deaths. This self-sacrifice limited the spread of the disease.

Cridford services for collection or delivery.

Collecting: sanitiser inside door, order put on table-middle of the hall for collection with no contact and allowing 2 metre distancing.

Delivering: every touched surface is sanitised disposable gloves worn in preparation/delivery. **Hot food/ takeaways** - Thursday, Friday & Saturday evenings 5-8pm.

Tuesday evenings: themed takeaways - alternating Pie / Italian nights. (collection /delivery)

Oven ready meals, with heating instructions - some suitable for freezing.

Produce: fresh fruit, vegetables, dairy, dry goods etc that we are able to get from our suppliers. Wine, bottled beers and soft drinks available

Payment: by card, by phone; under £30 contactless through the pub window.

Pick up a coffee, cake and snacks from the bench outside on our terrace. We will keep in touch with what is on offer and when it is available.

Please let us know if there is anything you need whatever it is, we will try our best to help.
